He and I went out fishing twice in Buck Bay where Johnny Morgan had been having wonderful luck in the evenings, but we got nothing unfortunately. He loves sailing, which is pleasant. He is at present being employed by Tony Frissel (Mac Bacon's wife), who is spending several days on Watch Island taking pictures for an article she is preparing for SPORTS ILLUSTRATED. She is going to pay David ten dollars a day to fetch and carry for her and run an outboard, so you can imagine how delighted he is.

We have been having passionate tennis every morning, mostly family. Shirley and Mummie kept beating David and Ann and finally even Mummie and I succeeded in doing this, somewhat to the dismay of the young people.

Now I want to find out definitely from you what your plans are. In other words, can we count on your coming back to us on August 10th? I do hope so, and that Phil will be able to be with us too before we leave. I am making railroad reservations for Eva Couture the night of September 4th, as that is as long as she wants to stay. Will that be all right by you? We are so flattered that you want to stay on at Whiskey, and I am sure you will have a happy time there, and it will anyway be a useful experience for you to operate the Island.
