Shirley and Betty had lunch here 0 days ago and both were drinking -- not much, but still a martini is a mar ini no matter how you look at it. In one telephone convervations with Auntie Do I made some remark to which she replied "but that way Hope won't be able to have a long private tall with Bets. They for along so well and she could help so much". I insisted that no long private talk was going to help Betty; this is a problem she herself must come with and the less said by other members of the family the better. If you see he would you please "appayer" the importance of her staying out of it all? Before we left the River I wrote her a long detailed letter, telling her what it's like to be an alcoholic and facing the decision to step out of danger. I teld her again and again that It's a very private affair and you want to be left alone, with help only from friends in AA. Apparently XXX I didn't manage to get the point scross.
